Collaboration

Looking at Christians making their exit out of the church premises, the skeptic philosopher, Neitzche remarked, "Look, the Walking Dead". An oxymoron, a sharp comment, some objective truth among many other thoughts and so warrants some reflection. I am braving this comment knowing well that Neitsche is dead long ago. But we run the risk of having the same said of us even as we move out of our church and into our communities. My hope springs from the conviction, Jesus came to give Life and Life in abundance.

We are into this year of Abundance already, celebrating the Golden Jubilee of the canonization of St. Vincent Pallotti. Indeed an important landmark. One of the important contributions of our patron saint to the Universal church is his idea of Collaboration of all the Catholics to revive and propagate faith and rekindle charity. "Faced with the worsening crisis of faith in his time and because of the growth of the Church's work in the missions, St. Vincent Pallotti saw the urgent need to revive the faith of Catholics, to renew their love and to unite all in Christ. To achieve this objective he considered it indispensable to secure the Collaboration of all the members of the Church: clergy, religious and laity, and unite their efforts in order to promote with greater effectiveness the apostolic mission of the Church". (Law of the Catholic Apostolate, Preamble b.)

Every bit of creation whether animate or inanimate after periodic spells of time needs renovation, revival, renewal or rejuvenation. What was true of the time of Pallotti is also true of TODAY. Somewhere our faith has slackened and needs to be revived and renewed. The catch phrase of Vatican II being, "aggiornamento" - renewal. This renewal has not yet percolated down to the grassroots. Little to wonder, that the Holy Father has already given a call to deepen our Faith and our understanding of it. As baptized in Christ we each of us share in the apostolic mission of Christ and the best way to carry out this mission is by being a vibrant believing community. So Faith is this gift which stands in need of revival and renewal.

Being in the parish I have observed that as individuals we are good, pious Catholics. It is indeed encouraging to see large numbers at the Sunday and even weekday masses. It is a joy for all of us three priests in the community to offer ourselves with renewed enthusiasm for all these liturgical and sacramental celebrations. It is never looked upon as a work load rather as an opportunity to be graced ourselves. Having said this, it is important to take note that the lack of growth is called stagnation. When a leaf starts turning yellow it is a sign of decay. That this may not happen to our communities, we need to do our bit of pruning and nourishing. Our faith would become more vibrant and effective if we could come together as believing community as the community of Jerusalem — 'of one heart and one Soul' (Acts 4:32) This is one area, where we need to further galvanize our efforts by being present and participating in the small Christian communities. It is here at the grassroots that we can test the authenticity of our faith. We come together around the Word of God, listen and reflect over it and see for ways to live this word in concrete ways; for faith without good works is dead (Jas 2:20). It is only when we translate our liturgy into life can we claim to be animated by Living Liturgies. Otherwise these may just remain catchy slogans that we hold aloft with each passing year without an impact of it upon our lives.

Keeping this in mind the Parish Pastoral Council in its very first meeting of this pastoral year set up reviving and building up Small Christian Communities (SCCs) as one of its priorities. Vincent Pallotti was of the view that individual initiatives would be more effective if they were integrated and directed towards a common goal. We place this common goal with the tool of asking you to collaborate. At the level of Pastoral animation the team and the parish council can make opportunities and adult / youth faith formation available. But it is You who will have to refuse the label of being, "the walking dead" and participate in these. Your coming, participating, contributing, collaborating will, under the animation of the Holy Spirit become the energizing breath that will pulsate life into the parish. For this we need each baptized Christian to take time out and be a part of this faith journey. Collaboration here is not for governance and organization, but a maturing into a Communitarian Spirit. This is what will make Lay Participation a Giant. With a renewed understanding of faith, exploring our call and translating into charity we will make a difference. This collaboration from your part at the zonal levels will eventually culminate at our worship of the Eucharist in church. Then as we move out of our church campus, some Neitsche of today may have to leave skepticism behind and remark, "the Walking Christians". For that is what the Master said in History, "Follow Me" and following essentially calls for walking and a walking alive.

Our coming and collaborating together will unfold and enable us to discover where our charisms and talents contribute growth. The early Christians found their calling some as evangelists, teachers, pastors, or at service. In the same mould we too can find the empty space meant by God for us in the various associations or cells of the parish. Our parish is blessed with number of cells and associations and so there is wide range of possibilities to collaborate. The scriptures tell us, "where two or three are gathered in my name, there I am in their midst". This however never meant that the Lord has an allergy for larger numbers. He will be present even among them, so let us in the spirit of collaboration join these cells and associations in larger numbers and in the true spirit.

May our patron inspire and intercede for us to collaborate and contribute to the mission of the church.

I once read a caption on a poster. It had the picture of a soldier bent over in deep contemplation and the words written at the bottom of the poster were –

The task ahead of me is great

But the force behind me is greater.

I have made this the motto of my life ever since. When I think of the many new beginnings I've had, I understand that - Every new beginning comes from some other beginning's end. - Seneca

Staying in the Gulf for so many years, starting and bringing up a family together with my husband was a pleasurable privilege. But in course of time, the recession got the better of us and we too, like millions of families' world over had to make this decision to return home. Life was going to change in ways more than we could comprehend. Starting anew away from my husband and the herculean responsibility of five growing children! Whoa! What a situation! There were questions crawling their way into our minds. What can we expect from this change? What was life going to challenge us with? – The fear of the unknown had set in. I took courage in the word of the Lord "For I know the plans I have for you, declares the Lord, plans for welfare and not for evil, to give you a future and a hope." (Jeremiah 29:11). With God by my side and His strength as my shield I ventured back home with my children, to settle down and start a new life – ANEW BEGINNING!

Luckily, we came at a time when summer vacation was on here and my kids got a chance to play with other kids in the building and in the church compound. That was the perfect lure to get them to like the place. Eventually, vacations came to an end and seeking admission into schools was the next hurdle. I wanted them to go to catholic schools for their spiritual formation along with academics and God saw us through this too. My kids go to catholic schools and are very happy and well adjusted. Initially, adjusting to a new syllabus with the Marathi language took them a while. The biggest blessing we have is the near proximity to church. The kids are involved in a few associations and activities at church and so are occupied with positive things to do with their time and talent. Some skills we had to learn again, like learning to cross the road. Initially the kids looked for zebra crossings and found almost none. Crossing Marol Maroshi road sometimes meant tiding across (and that's a huge tidal wave, I'm talking about) a sea of cars to get across to the other side! At times they forget that all roads here are two ways and so they must look on both sides. Also, when living far from Mumbai for long, among other things one misses eating out on the streets, to not so hygienically made and served bhel or pani puri - but that's Mumbai for you and eventually it builds immunity and we overlooked the hygiene bit to savour the delicacies. - A TOTALLY NEW BEGINNING FOR MY KIDS!

In the midst of all the settling down and starting anew I lost my passport. The worst thing that can happen to anyone is to lose a Government document. I applied for a new one. Five visits to the passport office enduring the heat, rain, serpentine queues and of course, fighting temptation and holding on to my Christian values, not to give in to bribing to speed up my work and I finally got my

new passport eight months later. Gosh! Getting a new passport was harder than delivering a baby. I had to wait for 3 months to get my ration card too and all I paid was Rs 4 for the application forms. Everyday here, is a new challenge in patience and integrity.

Coming back to Mumbai we also cherish some things that we see here better than anywhere else. Medical facilities here are much easily available, more affordable too. Almost everything is recycled here. Use of plastic bags is surely in moderation than what I have seen in the gulf. Our public transport services are the best.

Never having lived away from my husband since marriage, making decisions, disciplining the kids, etc. which was a joint task for us, became a solo challenge for me! Living a long distance relationship is a lot of work too. But thanks to Skype and mobile phones it's getting better. People ask me how I manage 5 kids. I just tell them this – Each day is a new challenge. Each day is a NEW BEGINNING. When I wake up in the morning I offer my day to God and every evening at prayer I thank him for a wonderful day that has gone by. It's been a year now since and we have now become Mumbaikars in the true sense. Us coming here was His divine plan and He helped us all the way through. I cannot thank and praise Him enough. "Who have I in heaven but you? And there is nothing on earth that I desire besides you. My flesh and my heart may fail, but God is the strength of my heart and my portion forever." Psalm 73:25-26

RECOLLECTION

(Liturgy Committee & Ushers Ministry)



On the 8th of July, the members of the Liturgy Committee & Ushers Ministry assembled at the church at 10.30am and after having refreshed ourselves with snacks and tea, we made our way to the Sisters Adorers' Chapel, to rest our hearts in silence and listen to the whisperings of God. The theme of the recollection was 'Listening'.

Fr. Paulo Dias gave us an inspiring talk, based on the Word of God, taken from (1 Kings 19: 11-13), which stirred us on to reflection and

sharing. God was not there in the wind, neither in earthquake nor in the fire; but in the silence of the heart. We can never hear the whisperings of God, if we are filled with the loud noises of the world. Making an inward journey, away from our external world is the need of the hour today. We need to strike a balance between our electronically connected world and the world of Divine space. Being too much connected to the exterior world, we are thrown into the misery of tension and stress. And we are afraid of facing ourselves in solitude/silence.

In (Lk 10:38 – 43), the story of Martha and Mary with Jesus, tells us how important it is to listen to the Divine Master and get into our ministry, wherein, we will be able to look beyond our life and find a sense of meaning, in all our doings. When we lose ourselves in this deafening world, "You will indeed listen, but never understand, and you will indeed look, but never perceive". (Mt 13:14).

The story of the 'affluent lady Catherine' also awakened our minds to the same harsh reality of today, of a 'life disconnected from the Divine'. In the midst of comfort zones of our lives, we terribly miss something in the depths of our hearts that is our relationship with the Lord.

During the second phase of the recollection we listened to the Lord, present in the Blessed Sacrament. The Eucharistic presence took us deeper into the meaning of silence. Fr. Charles led us to experience the Centurion's deep faith in Jesus, his gentleness and humility. No matter what life throws at us, like that of the Centurion, our faith in the Lord, our gentleness and humility can transform our lives, giving us a tremendous amount of strength, to engage ourselves in our ministries, as Ushers and members of the Liturgy Committee.

After a delicious and sumptuous meal, we were into some brainstorming sessions, led by Jennifer. After these very interesting and informative moments, all of us headed home, recharged, reenergized and with a feeling of having connected deeper with the Lord and with one another.
